What is the UPR?

REVIEW

PERIODIC

- Cycles of around 4.5 to 5 years
- 4^e cycle: 2022-2027

UNIVERSAL

• All member states are examined in each cycle



• Mechanism enabling the *Human Rights Council to* **examine** whether UN member states are meeting their human rights obligations and commitments.

What obligations are covered?

obligations, in accordance with:

- the <u>Charter of the United Nations</u>;
- the <u>Universal Declaration of Human Rights</u>;
- human rights instruments to which the State is a party (human rights treaties ratified by the State concerned);
- voluntary commitments and pledges made by the State (e.g. national human rights policies and/or programs);
- applicable international humanitarian law.

How does the UPR work?

PEER REVIEW

- Conducted by the 47 (elected) member states of the Human Rights Council. The 193 member states may ask questions, make observations or
- recommendations.

BASED ON 3 SOURCES OF INFORMATION OF EQUAL IMPORTANCE*

- National report
- Summary of information from the United Nations • Summary of *stakeholder* submissions: civil society, Indigenous organisations,
- national and regional human rights institutions, etc.



How does the review work?

1^e Step:

- Geneva, November 10, 2023, 9 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. (3.30 hrs)
- At a session of the UPR Working Group (WG)*,
- In the presence of the 193 UN member states, which Canada presented the elements to be considered could intervene (progress, challenges, etc.), then the States formulated In the presence of CSOs, Indigenous organizations and questions, statements or recommendations, to which other observers, who could not intervene Canada could respond or react.
- Covering the 3 reports already shared
- States submitted questions in advance
- 3 rapporteurs (troika), drawn by lot from the Board, facilitated the session: Kyrgyzstan, Paraguay, Belgium.
- The Canadian delegation was led by the Honourable Arif Virani, Minister of Justice and included Shalene Curtis-Micallef, Deputy Minister of Justice and Deputy Attorney General of Canada, and various representatives from the provinces and territories.

How does the review work?

2^e Step:

- In Geneva, March/April 2024 (1h Exact date to be confirmed)
- At the 55th regular session of the *Human Rights Council*
- Plenary session dedicated to reviewing and adopting the final document.
- In the presence of States, NHRIs and CSOs with consultative status, which can express their views on the final document.
- Final report published by OHCHR:

Response to recommendations The example of Cycle 4 in Canada

Immediately after the review (November 2023)

- On November 10, 2023, Canada received 357recommendations from 121 states. Some identical recommendations were grouped together for a total of **332 recommendations**.
- They concern federal, provincial/territorial or even municipal jurisdictions.
- The Canadian delegation worked with the Troika and the OHCHR to study the recommendations and, if necessary, request clarifications from the States concerned.
- At this stage, Canada starts to reflect on its position on each recommendation, either to A) Accept; B) Note or C) Consider for further response, after consultation with Canadian authorities and other stakeholders.

Before adoption of the final report (March 2024)

- Addendum 1: Canada must clearly present its position on all recommendations and the reasons for not accepting a recommendation.
- At this stage, each recommendation must be : A) Accepted or B) Noted Canada's deadline to respond: **February 12 2024**



"The primary responsibility for implementing the recommendations contained in the final report lies with the State. The UPR ensures that all countries are accountable for progress or failure in implementing these recommendations. [...]The State is required to provide information on the mechanisms put in **place** to implement the recommendations made, as well as on any developments in the field of human rights." **Office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights**

How to get involved

Before the Review:

A) Submitting communications for the *Stakeholder Communications Summary*:

- Individual or consortium papers, to be submitted to the UN before April 2023
- Open to organizations with or without consultative status
- Guidelines to be followed¹ : organization identification, length, language, non-confidentiality, etc.
- 64 submissions to the UPR4²

B) Contribute to the National Report

- In May 2023, Canada shared the draft report with 285 Canadian partners and stakeholders.

Participate in the UPR info pre-session: C)

inform member states about the human rights situation in Canada.








How to get involved

Post-review (implementation phase)

- Participate in the implementation of recommendations, particularly those concerning your areas of interest and expertise.
- Make Canada's commitments and obligations known, especially to the groups of people directly concerned;
- Encourage and strengthen the capacities of duty bearers and responsibility holders to meet their commitments and responsibilities, in line with the recommendations; Monitor and/or document progress in implementing recommendations, particularly those concerning your areas of interest and expertise;
