Equitas provides knowledge, skills and tools to support the empowerment of groups that are subject to discrimination, exclusion and other forms of human rights violations due to climate and environmental (in)action, particularly women and youth.

Through educational activities rooted in participatory, intersectional and human-rights-based approaches, Equitas empowers people to become change-makers and to take collective action to promote inclusion, participation and respect for human rights in the context of climate change.

## FEMMES PRO-FORÊTS PROJECT

Rural women and girls are disproportionately affected by climate change, but are rarely included in decision-making related to climate action and natural resource management.

Equitas' involvement in the Femmes Pro-Fôret project in Guinea focuses on advancing women's environmental rights and promoting feminist climate justice for more inclusive and equitable governance.



We work with women and young women in Moyen-Bafing National Park to identify the differentiated impacts of climate change and their links to women's rights.

Through learning and exchange activities, we empower women and civil society organizations to mobilize their communities to take action to address the root causes of climate change inequalities, to engage with decision-makers and to defend their rights (to a healthy environment and to participation, among others) in order to improve climate change adaptation.
